#### **CHIEKO MERZ**

January 18, 1942 – May 24, 2012

Chieko Merz died on May 24, 2012 after a two-year battle with cancer. She was surrounded by family and friends at her home in Chatsworth, California. Chieko was born on January 18, 1942 in Pacoima, California. She was the eighth and youngest child of Masayo and Ueto Matsuda. When Chieko was six months old, her family was interned at the Gila River Relocation Center in Arizona. At the end of WWII, the family returned to the San Fernando Valley. Chieko attended Roscoe Elementary School, Sun Valley Junior High School, and graduated from John H. Francis Polytechnic High School in Sun Valley. Chieko worked at a variety of places including Schlitz Brewery where she met Jim Merz. They were married on October 27, 1975 in Carmel, California.



They were married for twenty-seven years before Jim passed away in October of 2002.

Chieko enjoyed her retirement years golfing and going to the movies. In 2005, Chieko became an active member of the SFVJACL serving on the Board as co-chair of the doughball booth at the San Fernando Valley Hongwanji Buddhist Temple Obon. Shortly after, Chieko became a member of the SFVH Buddhist Temple and part of their Gatha group (choir group).

Chieko is survived by her four sisters, two brothers, in-laws, nieces and nephews.

# THIRD TUESDAY MOVIE OUTING



In **June**, *The Intouchables* provided us with a "feel good" movie outing. Breaking all box office records in France, *The Intouchables* is based on the true story of Philippe Pozzo de Borgo and Abdel Sellou (Driss). When a paragliding accident leaves wealthy widower Philippe a quadriplegic, potsmoking, just out of prison Driss is hired as Philippe's care-giver. A special bond transpires between this unlikely pair. Driss challenges Philippe to leave his comfort zone and Philippe appreciates his toughness and candor.

The Intouchables received a 71% rating from top critics but several critics found it too sentimental and predictable. This movie goer highly recommends this film and also enjoyed the musical sound track.

In **July**, ten **Woody Allen** fans saw *To Rome with Love*. The film is comprised of four separate vignettes and tells the story of a number of people in Italy – made up of Americans, Italians, residents and visitors – and the romances, adventures and predicaments they get into. In true Woody Allen form, the characters' weaknesses are exposed in their search for love or fulfillment. Like *Midnight in Paris*, Allen also puts Rome on display, giving us the pulse of the city. **Alec Baldwin, Ellen Page, Jesse Eisenberg, Penelope Cruz, Robert Benigni** and Allen make up the talented cast. There are quite a few laughs and even though critic ratings weren't very high, we all had a good time.

#### TAK YAMAMOTO HONORED

On June 17th, **Phil** and **Marion Shigekuni**, **Yas** and **Nancy Gohata** and **Harold** and **Ellen Kameya** traveled to the USC campus to attend a program to honor the pioneers in the API LGBT movement in Los Angeles.

Honored by the API Equality Los Angeles (APIELA) organization was our **Tak Yamamoto** and **June Lagmay**, who in 1980 were founders of the Asian Pacific Lesbians and Gays, the first gay Asian organization in Los Angeles. The Pioneer Project of APIELA created two short videos that documented the achievements of these two pioneers.

Tak Yamamoto served as the president of our San Fernando Valley JACL in 1990 and was instrumental in getting the national organization to support same-sex marriage in 1994. June Lagmay has been active in local politics and Asian community affairs, and has the prominent position as the Clerk of the City of Los Angeles.

The event was held at the One National Gay and Lesbian Archives on the USC campus.

Unfortunately, Tak was not feeling well and was unable to be at the event. **Dean Goishi**, founder and retired director of the APAIT (Asian Pacific AIDS Intervention Team) told the audience that Tak Yamamoto was his mentor. From the stories I have heard, Tak was unapologetically open about his sexual orientation and did not let that impede his programs and accomplishments as the president of the SFV JACL.

June Lagmay has a Filipino father who met his Japanese mother in Japan. Raised in Los Angeles in all-girls Catholic schools, she met and fell in love with her wife while in elementary school. During the 1970s 'flower power' decade, it was not uncommon for girls in her Catholic high school to be walking hand-in-hand down the hallways. She married her longtime partner Rita Romero during the 2008 window when gay marriages were declared to be legal in the state of California.

I am impressed and have learned a lot from our board members.

# SAVE THE DATE SUNDAY, OCTOBER 28, 2012



**Sharon Yamato** will be screening her documentary, *A Flicker in Eternity*, the story of **Stanley Hayami**, who served loyally with the 442<sup>nd</sup> Regimental Combat Team in Italy and France and died protecting his country. Sharon will also screen a short documentary, *Out of Infamy: Michi Nishiura Weglyn*, a portrait of the civil rights activist whose dynamic personality evolved – via incarceration during World War II in the Gila River, Arizona camp – from California-born farm girl, to New York City sophisticate to the Rosa Parks of Japanese Americans.

## TOM DOI AND SAM UYEHARA HONORED AT GOLD MEDAL CEREMONY

They sat on the stage in front of the Go For Broke Monument patiently waiting for the ceremony to begin. As I watched the 150 veterans dressed in white shirts, military hats and red, white and blue leis, I couldn't help but wonder if these veterans appreciated all the attention or if they were there due to the gentle urging of family and friends.

The Los Angeles Regional Congressional Gold Medal Ceremony for the veterans of the U.S. Army's 100<sup>th</sup> Infantry Battalion, 442 Regimental Combat Team and the Military Intelligence Service was held on June 9, 2012 in Little Tokyo to honor their service, sacrifice and bravery during World War II. This was the regional version of The White House ceremony held in Washington, D.C., on November 2, 2011.

Among the honorees were past SVF JACL Presidents



Sam Uyehara (unable to attend) and Tom Doi. Many widows and family members of deceased veterans were in attendance to receive the Gold Medal on behalf of their loved ones. The Master of Ceremonies was KABC news anchor David Ono. Maj. Gen. Rodney Kobayashi gave the keynote address. Reps. Adam Schiff, Judy Chu, Maxine Waters, Lucille Roybal-Allard and LA Councilmember Jan Perry handed out the congressional Gold Medal replicas to each veteran as their names were simultaneously read by members of the Japanese American Bar Association.

The Go For Broke Monument was a fitting backdrop for the Ceremony. "Go For Broke!" was the motto adopted by all of the Japanese-American units formed during World War II. Names of more than 16,000 Nisei soldiers have been engraved on the monument that serves as a tribute of remembrance and honor to them. One side of the Gold Medal features Nisei soldiers with the inscriptions on the outer rim *NISEI SOLDIERS OF WORLD WAR II* and *GO FOR BROKE*.

As the ceremony came to a close with the singing of "America The Beautiful" and taps, the veterans received a standing ovation that brought tears of pride and gratitude from the widows and family members. My dad was one of those who had required some gentle urging to attend the ceremony. After the group photos were taken, there was a reception with fellow veterans. Walking down 1<sup>st</sup> Street after the event, my dad said "Gee, I didn't think there would be this many people here and that it would be such a big event. They really did a good job." Translation: He was glad that we encouraged him to attend!



# KATAROU HISTORIES PROGRAM

PSW JACL staff **Marissa Kitazawa**, **Eri Kameyama** and with our **Molly Serizawa** have brought to the SFV JACL a pilot historical preservation program with a focus on the San Fernando Valley Japanese Americans. The 10-week program is designed to familiarize participants with their fellow class members by sharing their individual stories and experiences through fun games and interactive exercises in the process building trust and understanding of inter-generational concerns and issues.

The class members for this years programs range in age from fifteen years to early 80s. The participants are Nisei, Kibei, Sansei, Yonsei, Gosei and a young shin Issei. The diverse perspectives of the members have provided the organizers and participants an exciting opportunity to interact and learn from each other not just from the lecturers and leaders. Every contributing visitor has introduced new insight into our Japanese American historical experience and added to the richness of the experience.

As a member of the class, the most remarkable part of the program I am witnessing is the blossoming of the members as we share our experiences. Not only are we building community, cementing our generational network but providing a forum for each of us to grow our talents and demonstrate our abilities.

We are only half way through the program and our final project is to produce a film, power point presentation or art work that illustrates the history of the Japanese Americans in the San Fernando Valley.

# JACL 2012 NATIONAL CONVENTION/SEATTLE, WASHINGTON

July 5 - 8, 2012

Seattle rain or overcast was my memory of the climate, when I used to live there. However, when Traci and I landed at Sea-Tac, we were welcomed with sunshine and 73 degree temperatures. Convention was all business, but without the responsibilities of last years convention, lots of fun this year. There were plenty of tours to Seattle and Bellevue for those folks who wanted to see the historic sites and check out the east side.

I will let the Pacific Citizen inform you of the convention and only report the one important issue that affected us here in southern California. Last April, National Board passed the proposed 2013-2014 Budget. It

eliminated the Pacific Southwest District Regional Director position that remained vacant due to a hiring freeze. An amendment to the budget to restore the PSW RD position was presented and the council needed to pass it. With very little opposition (only two of the 86 opposed it), the amendment and the budget passed. We not only got back our Regional Director, the Pacific Citizen retained their editor. So read the next issue of the Pacific Citizen.

The 2013 National Convention will be held in Washington DC in mid July. JACL will be celebrating the 25th Anniversary of the signing of the Civil Liberties Act of 1988 with many events throughout the week in DC. Article submitted by **Nancy Takayama**

# JAPANESE AMERICANS - MIA RETREAT

Japanese Americans Mobilizing in Asian America, the title for the retreat which was the brainstorm of creator, **Traci Ishigo** from the SFV. The one-day workshop was held Saturday, July 15, 2012 at the SFV JA Community Center.

Traci, who is the Student Body President at UC Irvine, had the support of the JACL to present a program which introduced the JA community to various political considerations and examined our individual identity and attitudes toward those political issues. Her well developed approach challenged us to look at our preconceived notions, set aside our long held ideas and formulate a broader, more encompassing political perspective.

By including a Samoan panelist, Natasha Saelua, associate director of UCLA's Community Programs office, who brought a Pacific Islander perspective with divergent and shared interests. Also, on the same panel were, Jessica Kawai with the Little Tokyo Service Center, Seniors Program and a current Miss Nisei Week princess, Yuka Ogina, a UCLA student organizer, and Marissa Kitazawa, PSW JACL staff who spoke about the Bridging Communities Program that united Asians with Muslim students whose families faced a similar situation post 9/11 as that of the 1942 Japanese American community. Also leading the gender workshop was Riku Matsuda, a Senior Intergroup Relations Specialist for the L.A. Country Human Rights Commission.

One workshop issue rarely discussed in the Asian community was the one on services for persons with disabilities. Patty Kinaga, an employment law attorney and chair of the Asian Pacific Islanders with Disability of California, APIDC, a non-profit organization, and Peter Wong, a doctoral candidate at UCLA's School of Public Policy, led this workshop. They reported that compared to the rest of America, the Asian and Pacific Islander community is about thirty years behind. They suggested that this is also the case in Japan and that the shame associated with and attaching to the families with disabled family members makes the Asian community reluctant to seek out assistance. However, as the state and nation have passed legislation to insure fairness for individuals with disabilities, this is an issue that needs to be brought out of the shadows, especially as our sansei generation is getting older and like their parents are likely to need greater access to these kinds of services.
