

#### THE SIGNIFICANCE OF TULE LAKE

A couple of years ago, **Marion, Nancy Gohata** and I attended a panel presentation in Torrance dealing with the Tule Lake Camp and Segregation Center. It was most informative and thought provoking. Since then, some in our chapter have seen two plays by former Tule Lake internee, **Hiroshi Kashiwagi** concerning Tule Lake..

Hiroshi's son, **Soji** produced the plays. After one of the plays, Hiroshi answered questions from the audience. What I remembered most about Hiroshi was the pain in his voice in talking about the rejection he felt after the war in seeing, once again, his old friends who had been in other camps. This rejection was so deeply felt that when he attended UCLA, he deliberately chose non-JA friends.

In August I was invited to a meeting at JANM held by the officials of the National Park Service who convened the meeting to seek community involvement in establishing Tule Lake as a WWII Valor in the Pacific National Park. At the meeting, **Yukio Kawaratani** made an impassioned plea for a better understanding of the ordeal he and his family endured in Tule Lake.

What I found amazing was that President George Bush, in leaving office in 2008, proclaimed Tule Lake as a WWII Valor in the Pacific National Monument. Included in this group of awardees were sites at Pearl Harbor and other historic battle sites in the islands west of Alaska. This designation was made despite the fact that Tule Lake was the site where families and individuals were sent who answered "no,no" to the infamous loyalty questions and/or chose to repatriate to Japan!

After he was involved in the dedication of the WWII Valor Monument in 2009, National JACL President, **Floyd Mori**, declared that we in the community need to hear from these people who endured Tule Lake.

Two members of our board were interned in Tule Lake. Nancy Gohata's family responded "no-no" to the questionnaire, and **Nancy Oda** was born there. When she was a student a UCLA, Nancy Oda wrote a major paper describing her family's experience in Tule Lake.

The two Nancy's are willing to participate in a program next year to educate our community. The time is long overdue for this to happen.

#### **PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**

September, 2012



When I was a teenager attending school in the San Fernando Valley in the 1970s and 1980s, I experienced a modicum of bullying because of my race (yes, they picked on me because of my height, too!). I didn't give it much thought, but I do remember how it made me feel: angry, depressed, different & isolated. Today, bullying has gotten a lot of attention and, in particular, Asian bullying. Why? What makes Asians any different than other ethnic groups?

In 2009, the US Department of Education conducted a study on bullying and found that nearly one in three middle and high school students report being bullied. In that same study, 54% of Asian American teenagers were bullied in school, significantly higher than any other ethnic group: 38.4% for African-American, 34.3% for Hispanics and 31.3% for whites. Suicide rates and depression are on the rise as well for Asian youths. Statistics and numbers don't really tell the story. Let's put faces to this problem.

In December 2009, at a South Philadelphia high school, 26 Asian immigrant students were being bullied and physically assaulted sending 13 of them to the hospital. In 2011, 19-year-old **Danny Chen**, who was serving in the US Army in Afghanistan, apparently committed suicide after being bullied with racial slurs and physical attacks by his peers and supervisors. He often endured taunts including racial slurs like "gook" "chink" and "dragon lady." **Lance Corporal Harry Lew**, USMC, committed suicide after fellow marines physically assaulted him punching and stomping on his back and throwing sand in his face. Before taking his life, Lew wrote on his arm, "*may hate me now, but in the long run this was the right choice I'm sorry my mom deserves the truth*."

Some of the reasons Asian may be targeted for bullying could include the "nerd" stereotype and passiveness, obvious language differences or accents when speaking English, social awkwardness or even the trending anti-immigration sentiment in some parts of the US. These things are difficult to change, but there is another potential reason that can be changed. Many Asian parents place pressure on their kids to acclimate into society, often telling them to "suck it up " or "don't make waves." There is also a tendency (maybe it's cultural) for Asians in general to be quiet and hold their emotions inside rather than talk through issues or express one's emotions.

I spoke to a friend of mine, **Dan Puder**, who founded My Life, My Power, a program to help youths combat bullying through various means including self

esteem, self-empowerment and body image. He also has a unique approach to dealing with bullies utilizing education and realization from the victims' perspectives instead of just punishment. Dan told me that communication is critical in dealing with kids today. "They are a different generation and are programmed differently", said Dan. "Parents need to adjust to how life is today for their kids instead of looking at how they handled things when they were kids."

I am certainly not implying that anyone is not parenting correctly or that your kids suffer from depression and thoughts of suicide. But I do believe bullying is a serious problem and I do believe we can help our kids deal with it. So take some time to talk to your teenagers and let them know they can come talk to you about anything. Talk to them about bullying. Let them know there are resources they can utilize if they are not comfortable talking to you. Believe me, they are experiencing bullying whether they talk about it or not. I know I did. I know I never talked about it as a kid.

#### KATAROU HISTORIES CULMINATION

The Katarou Histories class celebrated its Culmination program at the SFV JACC, Thursday, August 23, 2012. Class members ranged in age from 15 years, high school teenagers, college students to adult professionals, and a few retired members of the community, including 80 plus year, **Tom Serizawa**. The other participants were **Alyssa Himeno, Kristen Himeno, Brandon Isa, Hawk Kuwata, Evelyn Mitarai, Isabelle Miyata, Les Nakashima, Paige Negoro, Nancy Oda, Kylie Rosero-Ozawa, Ariane Sadanaga, Kevin Sato, Grace Serizawa, Patricia Takayama, Kara Tanaka, and Janet Yamamoto.** 

The 10 week, multi-generational program forged friendships between young and older Nikkei while playing games, writing poetry, and working in groups to learn about individual talents and common history to create a winning team. By looking at personal experiences from an Asian identity perspective, class members were able to reflect on their own experiences as political. By sharing stories, the group came to see the value and need to preserve the history of Japanese Americans in the San Fernando Valley.

The final program featured two films and an exhibit of events and organizations as they developed in the San Fernando Valley. The subject of the films included interviews with persons about the Obon festivals and the history of San Fernando Aces baseball team and athletics organized in conjunction with the SFV JA community center. The films provided a means of viewing the impact of regular and continuous activity as a thread that creates a Japanese American historical connection to the SFV and the community center.

The third project was an exhibit that showed the history of the SFV JA Community Center, its expansion and how it came to be the anchor for a Japanese American Village. The collection of photos show only a few of the extensive activities and organizations that utilize the center, including the hot meal programs, girls and boys basketball, hula and line dancing, mah jong, hana fuda, bridge and poker just to name a few of the organizations that use the community center regularly. The exhibit will be on display in the foyer of the Pioneer Center beginning October 2012.

The Katarou Histories class was a pilot program by the PSW JACL staff, **Marissa Kitazawa** and **Eri Kameyama** with intern **Molly Serizawa**. The effort to collect and preserve SFV Japanese American history is expected to continue. Oral interviews, photos and documents will be collected and eventually a resource center established at the community center by volunteers. **Nancy Takayama**, whose previous collaboration with CSUN to collect oral interviews acted as the moving force to bring the Katarou Histories Program to the SFV JA Community. Plans are currently under discussion to develop a program for next year to continue the development of a Japanese American History Preservation Project with volunteers and possibly interns.

# THIRD TUESDAY MOVIE OUTING



In August, our movie was *The Bourne Legacy*. New hero Aaron Cross played by **Jeremy Renner** from the 2010 Academy Award Winning Film, *The Hurt Locker*, takes us on this thrilling, action packed spy journey. Field agent Cross is a subject in an ultra-secret program called Outcome, which aims to chemically increase physical and cognitive capabilities. Cross, along with five other agents, are part of a highly secretive CIA program that has been compromised and needs to be shut down. Five agents are killed, but Cross survives. His only ally is Dr. Martha Shearing, (**Rachel Weisz**) who has been helping create the programs' enhancing drugs. For the remainder of the film, we tensely watch Cross and Shearing outsmart their former bosses to survive, ending in a quintessential chase scene through the streets of Manila.

It wasn't the easiest plot to follow, but references to the original Bourne series motivated this moviegoer to see the Jason Bourne trilogy again.

Our September movie was *Sleepwalk With Me*. *Sleepwalk With Me* is an autobiographically inspired fictional film by stand-up comedian, **Mike Birbiglia**. Birbiglia, as Matt Pardamiglio, takes us on his journey as a struggling stand-up comedian who's caught in a stale eight-year relationship, and wild spurts of severe sleepwalking. There's plenty of laughs as Matt stumbles along trying to make it as a comedian. We're also frustrated at times with his self-deprecating and indecisive personality, but sympathetic to the pressure he's under from a gruff, no-nonsense father and his own lack of direction.

The film received an 86% rating from Rotten Tomatoes and we found the movie quite entertaining. On a personal note, in the film, Matt, seeks the help of sleep disorder expert, **Dr. William Charles Dement**. Dr. Dement played himself in the movie. He is a pioneering U.S. sleep researcher and founder of the Sleep Research Center, the world's first sleep laboratory at Stanford University. Dr. Dement was a mentor to **Dr. Clete Kushida**, nephew of JACL members, **Al** and **Mitzi Kushida**. Dr. Kushida now directs the sleep Research Center at Stanford University.




