

PRESIDENT'S MESSSAGE



September 21, 2017

There was a whole lot to cover at our September board meeting. The Pacific Southwest JACL District fund raising meeting in August was a success. Money was raised in support of a fund in memory of **Dr. Ted Namba**, a JACL leader in Phoenix. Vigilant Love, an activist community organization held a JA/Muslim student dialogue at a university in Fullerton on September 17th. The American Buddhist Study Center, based in New York, is sponsoring a program on October 1st at the Aratani Theatre in honor of **George Aratani**, a generous donor to many organizations in our community. The event would mark his 100th birthday. He passed away 4 years ago. Board member **Nancy Oda's** "Only the Oaks Remain" is the subject of luncheon to be held on October 8th at the Quiet Canyon restaurant in Monterey Park. The board decided to sponsor five scholarship winners and their families to the event. In addition, about 17 JACL members will be attending this landmark event. An Image Awards Dinner, sponsored by the Organization of Chinese Americans/Greater LA will be held on October 13th. Honored will be Asian Americans making significant contributions to our communities. An individual heading the "Tuesday Night Open Mike" in Little Tokyo will be recognized. The NCIAPIA (National Queer Asian Pacific Islander Alliance) will be sponsoring a ground-breaking conference on October 14th. On the panel will be gay/lesbian, transgender persons, from different Asian backgrounds.

Our chapter, together with the SFV Hongwanji Buddhist Temple and the Chatsworth West United Methodist Church is sponsoring an interfaith dialogue on October 21st. I will be moderating a community forum with **Rev. Patricia Usuki** of the Hongwanji Temple presenting the Buddhist perspective, and **Rev. Ruy Mizuki** of the Chatsworth West United Methodist Church presenting the Christian position.

Patty Takayama reported on the writing project she is heading featuring writer and playright **Tim Toyama** who volunteers at the Gardena JA Cultural Institute. Her sister, **Nancy Takayama** spoke about a senior workshop, recently organized, which is instructing seniors on lap top computers and smart phones.

Of particular note was the plight of a young JA woman, **Meg Shimatsu**, who was interviewed by **Steve Lopez** of the LA Times. Her story was subsequently picked up the Rafu Shimpo. Meg is in need of a kidney donation and has gone online asking for financial help. Our board contributed \$200.00. She is

on dialysis three days a week and lives in her car in Glendale. Fortuitously, Ventura JACL Chapter President, **Anne Chilcott** happened to have bought a car from Meg's cousin a few years ago and put me in touch with Meg though her cousin. She is now living with him on the week-ends. I will be hosting Meg at our senior luncheon this Friday, and I look forward to getting acquainted with her.

BUDDHIST/CHRISTIAN DIALOGUE

Because of our history of discrimination in this country JACL has taken a strong position in support of Muslims who face oppression much like that which Japanese Americans faced during and after WWII.

A significant number of JACL members profess beliefs in Buddhism or Christianity. If we are to support Muslims in their quest for equality, it would be helpful to share our understanding of the beliefs we hold within our community.

Our Chapter, in cooperation with the Council for Pacific Asian Theology (CPAT), is sponsoring a Buddhist Christian Dialogue on October 21 at 2:00 p.m. at the San Fernando Valley Japanese American Community Center. Presenting the Buddhist perspective will be **Rev. Patricia Utsuki**, minister at the San Fernando Valley Hongwangi Buddhist Church located adjacent to the Community Center. **Rev. Ruy Mizuki**, pastor of the Chatsworth West United Methodist Church will present the Christian position. Moderating will be **Rev. Dickson Yagi**, Director of CPAT, who spent over 30 years in Japan and has intimate knowledge of both religions. This should be an informative panel. Hope you will make plans to attend.

During the Labor Day weekend, the Tuna Canyon Detention Station was threatened by the La Tuna Fire but our beloved oak grove remained untouched despite the fact that more than 7000 acres were scorched. Just a little bit of the treetops got singed. Thank you for all of your concern.

On October 8, the Tuna Canyon Detention Station Coalition will hold a fundraiser to match a 2017 National Park Japanese American Confinement sites grant. The Honorary Chairman is Representative Adam Schiff who represents the 28th district and is a ranking member of the Intelligence Committee. Adam has been supportive of Tuna Canyon and its history since 2013.

In addition, there will be a premier of "Only the Oaks Remain" by the Grateful Crane Ensemble. The Grateful Crane Ensemble, Inc. is a non-profit theater group whose mission is to present educational and theatrical programs in appreciation for the unique hardships and inspiring contributions of Japanese Americans in our country's history. The script for the luncheon comes directly from Tuna Canyon detainee's moving diaries, letters and poems.

Since establishing our nonprofit only four years ago, we have actively reached out to the Japanese, German, Italian, and Japanese Peruvian communities to preserve their stories while confined in Tujunga, California during World War II.

During the 2017 season, we were fortunate to display our story at the Japanese American National

Museum for sixteen weeks, then to the Pasadena Playhouse when "Hold These Truths" was shown, the Manzanar Pilgrimage, and then, to Bolton Hall Museum in Tujunga. Dr. Lloyd Hitt was proud to report that 400+ visitors came when he and the Little Landers Historical Society led tours. The traveling exhibit will go to Oregon Nikkei Legacy Center this fall then to the Santa Barbara History Museum in January through April 2018.

On Saturday, August 12, 2017, we held our last "Telling Our Stories" class meeting for this year. From March until mid-August our instructor, academy award winner, **Tim Toyama** led three sessions with writing prompts, topics and show and tell suggestions on Thursday evenings and Saturday afternoons. Class members came together to tell their dramatic stories and share humorous experiences in a safe inviting circle of friendship.

Tim had this to say about the classes. "The writing workshop has been an amazing experience for me: not only hearing great and unique stories, but meeting interesting and fun people. Writing and preserving our stories is important. The stories connect people and children so future generations will know and appreciate their heritage."

Class members hailed from Nisei, Sansei, Yonsei, Happa and non-Asian participants. The geographical origin and travel experiences of the class members reflected their unique and fascinating stories. Some of the stories included experiences from camp, from Hawaii, Tonga, Japan and holidays with non-Japanese relatives and New Years food or Obon traditional activities. Sharing our stories provided us an opportunity to compare notes - what was unusual and what was normal in other Japanese American households, including rituals and attitudes.

Some of the comments from class members included: "Thanks for inviting me to the class." "It was fun." "I really enjoyed hearing other people's stories." "The class was really friendly." "I liked sharing stories." "I learned so much." "The stories were so fascinating." "I was surprised how much people revealed about their attitudes and personal lives in their stories." "You have a chance to see and understand and feel close to the class members as friends."


