PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



This past month, our organization has been active in pursuing the civil rights and cultural heritage of the Japanese American citizen as, that is our mission of the SFV JACL.

On Saturday, September 7th, 2019, SFV JACL sponsored a Family Roots program, where children were encouraged to come out with their family members and learn about their Japanese cultural heritage: language, art, music, songs, instruments and family history. Embracing our history and culture provides children an opportunity to visit things that are fun, fascinating, and beautiful and makes them proud to be part Japanese. Pride, self-confidence and a willingness to embrace one's identity is important to nurture children with a healthy Japanese, Asian American identity.

In addition, members of the SFV JACL chapter participated in "We've Got Your Back... Pack" event at the Aratani Theater, on Saturday 21st to raise funds and bring awareness of the outrageously cruel treatment of child migrants being held in cages at the Mexican border, under inhumane conditions – lack of proper or clean habitat, food, water or health and safety protection.

Much of our time and effort, during the 1970s – 1980s was devoted to making our JA community and America aware of the contributions of Japanese American to our U.S. history. As part of our Asian American legacy and contributions to the changes in our American and Constitutional history, we now hold a duty to remind generations henceforth that "their battle" is "our battle", that others who now suffer under cruel and discriminatory conditions are joined in their fight against government and administrative inhumane treatment.

As we recognize our ability to unite and join forces against those who try to keep us from speaking with one voice, we will find that the administration will continue to prevent us from standing up to our detractors or those who currently wield power. We are greater in number and can speak with a louder voice, if we show up, have the courage to speak up and most importantly, we register to vote and cast ballots in the elections next year.

We the People, are all of us who show up to speak truth to power and cast our ballots on behalf of all those who need protection of our civil rights and want equality of representation and economic opportunity. *We the People, are all of us who vote.*



For this year's 50th Manzanar Pilgrimage, **Phil and Marion Shigekuni** accompanied many Muslim leaders, on their bus to the Pilgrimage. Phil spoke about Manzanar and the history of the internment years. After this experience **Ekram Haque**, president of the Dallas/Fort Worth Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR)asked Phil to speak to his Chapter members in Dallas. As with the JACL, their national headquarter is in Washington DC. with Chapters throughout the country.

Phil spoke to about 40-50 people, both young and old. The audience was very receptive, especially as Phil related our wartime incarceration with the current discrimination facing Muslims and others in this country.

Phil and Marion were most appreciative with the hospitality they received from Ekram, his wife and other Chapter members. It gave them both a chance to learn more about Islam, and become acquainted with other Muslims.

SEARCHING FOR OUR JAPANESE AMERICAN ROOTS

The students from, five to seventeen years old, their parents, Meiji Club members, and friends joined together for the first "Searching for our Japanese American ROOTS" program held on Saturday, September 7th at the SFVJACC. The attendees enjoyed meeting new people and eating pizza together before the start of the program. The opening performance was the San Fernando Valley Taiko group, and they, literally, started our program off with a BANG. **Reid Taguchi**, instructional leader, invited the youth and adults to join them on Sundays to learn how to play the taiko. Next, the picture book, "Grandfather's Dream" by Allen Say was shown on the large screen with the story read by Shaun Iwaoka. A slide presentation, by **Kiyo Fukumoto**, showed the history of Japanese immigrants coming to the United States with their dream of wealth and success, and the obstacles and difficulties they faced after their arrival.

The children were divided into groups and they moved to different learning stations. The learning stations included **Family Tree**, developing a chart of their family, **Calligraphy**, led by **Tosh Noda** and **Mrs. Ikuko Sogabe**, writing individual names on a scroll in *katakana, or hiragana*, **Learning Taiko**, led by **Reid Taguchi**, participants played the taiko, **Japanese Language**, led by **Patty Takayama**, **Ariel Imamoto**, and **Liz Doomey**, students were taught Japanese words and phrases, **Singing Japanese Songs**, led by **Nancy Gohata** and **Julie Otake**.

The children learned Suzume no Gakkou, Musunde, and Haru ga Kita. The children sang the newly learned song on stage to an appreciative audience. The final activity was the **Obon Odori**, "**Pokémon**," led by **Christine Inouye** and **Linda Tanaka**. We all enjoyed dancing and laughing together. The students all received a "goodie bag" which included individual photographs of their participation in the day's activities. We all benefited from sharing and learning about our roots and hopefully we can join together again next year.

WE GOT YOUR BACK...PACK

A Benefit Concert for Migrant Children Presented by the Nikkei Progressives Aratani Theater September 21, 2019

On a pleasant fall evening, SFVJACL members and over 300 others joined the Nikkei Progressives in supporting the needs of children. The families and children seeking asylum will be supported with these funds to purchase children's supplies that will be placed in backpacks, provide legal aid, bond payments so the detained families and children can be released prior to their court dates.

The opening activities began with a Tongva Blessing provided by Tina Orduno Calderon, an Elder who represented the Gabrielino Tongva and Chumash nations. All of us participated by bowing to the compass points beginning with the North which represents the children. Each stage of humankind is represented by the compass points. In the Tonvga language "Ewachem" means, "We are still here" and the Native American spirit resonated with the chanting of the blessing.

The Little Tokyo/Japanese American Organizations issued a Fort Sill Statement against the imprisonment of children and asylum seekers. Fort Sill began as a detention area for Native American and children and other Nativists such as Geronimo who died in 1909 while at Fort Sill.

East L.A. Taiko provided a multicultural taiko group mixed with Afro-Cuban rhythms and taiko beats. The group swayed their way to the entrance inviting us to enter the Aratani Theater. **Phil and Marion Shigekuni** and I joined the East L.A. Taiko and danced away toward the entrance to enjoy the concert.

Inside the theater we were joined by **Nancy Oda** who rushed from the SFVJACC Steak Dinner leaving her husband, Kay behind to sweat behind the grills for the barbeque. Later we met **Kiyo Fukumoto** as we exited the theater.

The Nikkei Progressives explained their stance supporting the protests at Fort Sill. Their motto, "NEVER AGAIN IS NOW!" clearly states their belief. The Nikkei Progressives began as a small all-volunteer organization. They support the human and civil rights of immigrants, Muslim American and other groups who face marginalization and discrimination. The Nikkei Progressive believe in building bridges between people. They firmly hold that families belong together and that children separated from their parents must be reunited immediately. They state that migrants and asylum seekers deserve safety and freedom from violence and imprisonment in prison camps.

Comparisons to the nightmare of Executive Order 9066 were made by Japanese Americans who had suffered the imprisonment in Camps during World War II. A film clip showed the actual protests at Fort Sill which led to the reversal of the Federal orders to use Fort Sill as a holding prison for children and families. The courageous men and women who peacefully and calmly refused to move away from the Fort Sill area despite threats to arrest them by military police are wonderful examples for the rest of us to stand up for the rights of the oppressed. Protesters included Buddhist priests such as **Duncan Ryuken Williams** who is our Keynote Speaker for our Installation Luncheon. The strings of gently waving paper tsuru (paper cranes) punctuated the fierceness of their stance eventually causing the Federal government to rescind the order to imprison children at Fort Sill. A small, but important victory.

The remainder of the evening was a rousing mix of musical cultures. The Grammy Award Winning Quetzal Quartet provided solos from their children on piano and vocals as well as the tacones (flamenco heel tapping) as percussion instruments. Members of Cambalache joined the stage and provided back up for Maya Jupiter a Turkish-Mexican Australian rapper who sang "Inshallah, Mashallah" (God willing, Thanks to God) and Alice Bag, an early punk rocker who will never go quietly into the night.

The pounding Finale of the evening was the appearance of Aloe Blacc who uses his voice for social change and the TAIKOPROJECT (led by Bryan Yamami) combined with the full cast as a call out for LOVE not hate.
